WHY BLINDNESS REDUCTION PROGRAM?

- One out of every three blind people in the world lives in India
- There are 12 million people blind in India.
- 7.4 million i.e. 62% have cataract related blindness
- 19.7 million are blind due to refractive error 3.6 million children are blind under the age of 16 Yrs
- 80% of blindness is avoidable i.e. readily treatable and preventable
- Incidence of blindness are significantly higher in rural area, where 75% population lives in 6.38 Lakh villages.

- · Huge backlog of patients suffering from eye-diseases, especially cataract increasing year after year. Govt. Hospitals/Private eye surgeons not fully geared up to
- cope up with this grave challenge. . Long distance from villages to cities where eye hospitals are located-a big constraint
- Many organizations working in this field are reluctant to reach out to remote rural slum and tribal areas.
- Finance major constraint for blindness since treatment is
- expensive in Private and Govt. hospitals not adequately equipped.
